#### About the Texas Youth Sequential Intercept Model

The Texas Youth Sequential Intercept Model (SIM) is a strategic planning tool used to create a communitywide response for youth with mental illness (MI), substance use disorders (SUD), and intellectual and developmental disabilities (IDD) who encounter and move through the juvenile justice system. Using the Youth SIM, communities consider resources and identify gaps and opportunities across their local systems.

Collaborating closely with state agencies working at the intersection of youth behavioral health and juvenile justice systems, the Texas Health and Human Services Commission Office of Forensic Coordination adapted the Critical Intervention Model developed by the National Center for Youth Opportunity and Justice to create a Texas-specific model.



#### Workshops Available for Youth SIM Mapping

The Texas Behavioral Health and Justice Technical Assistance Center offers a Youth SIM mapping workshop that brings together community leaders and different agencies and systems to identify strategies for diverting youth with MI, SUD, IDD, or a combination of these disorders, away from the juvenile justice system and into treatment.



Throughout the one-and-a-half day workshop, trained facilitators tap into local expertise to:

- Use the Youth SIM to develop a comprehensive picture of how youth with mental illness and co-occurring disorders move through the juvenile justice system along five distinct intercept points.
- Identify gaps and resources across the SIM.
- Identify local services to support diversion from the juvenile justice system.
- Introduce community leaders and staff to evidence-based and emerging best practices.
- Enhance relationships across systems and agencies.
- Create action plans to address identified gaps and community priorities.

#### **Mapping Helps**

#### **Communities Identify and Prioritize Best Practices Across the Justice System**

**Collaboration** between juvenile justice and behavioral health professionals to appropriately and effectively provide services to youth with behavioral health conditions.

**Identification** of youth behavioral health needs at all critical stages of juvenile justice processing.

**Diversion** of youth with behavioral health needs to effective community-based treatment whenever possible.

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**Treatment** to effectively meet the needs of youth with behavioral health conditions in the juvenile justice system.

#### Intercept 0: Schools and Community-Based Services

At this intercept, communities connect children to behavioral health care through community- and school-based services.

Best practices include:

- Early identification and prevention
- School-based diversion and behavioral health supports
- Ensuring there is someone to call, someone to respond, and a place to go.

1 Initial Contact with Law Enforcement

#### Intercept 1: Initial Contact with Law Enforcement

This intercept begins when a child with a behavioral health condition faces disciplinary action in the community or at school and ends when the child is arrested or diverted into treatment.

Best practices include:

- Law enforcement mental health training.
- Police diversion programs.
- Law enforcement and mental health provider collaboration.

Intercept 2:
Initial Referral to Juvenile

**Justice System** 

This intercept begins when a referral to juvenile probation is made.

Best practices include:

- Juvenile probation behavioral health assessment, treatment and intervention.
- Early diversion and prevention programs, and juvenile justice stakeholder collaboration.

## Intercept 3: Judicial Processing

This intercept begins with either pre-trial diversion or when the juvenile case is referred to a prosecutor to be disposed.

Best practices include:

- Specialized court interventions.
- Pre-trial intervention.
   Streamlined fitness to proceed processes.

### Intercept 4: Re-Entry

This final intercept encompasses transition planning and continuity of care for youth with behavioral health needs reentering the community.

Best practices include:

- Transition planning.
- Coordinated after-care services
- Trauma-informed supervision practices.
