Reentry Learning Collaborative

Texas Health and Human Services Commission (HHSC) Behavioral Health Services completed the fiscal year 2025 reentry learning collaborative. The collaborative supported local teams in building reentry programs that promote continuity of care and recovery support for people with mental illness or co-occurring substance use disorders returning to the community after incarceration in a local jail.

HHSC partnered with Rulo Strategies and the Texas Institute for Excellence in Mental Health to facilitate the collaborative. Fourteen competitively selected teams from 23 counties, representing more than 35 organizations, came together to share strategies, build partnerships, and improve outcomes for people with behavioral health needs transitioning from jail to the community.

Key Takeaways

Participants deepened their understanding of key reentry topics, including enrolling or reenrolling in benefits, accessing housing and transportation, and finding employment after incarceration.

Participating communities reported that sessions on reentry models and continuity of care were the most helpful in supporting their local reentry efforts. Participants also expressed greater confidence in evaluating program effectiveness and a stronger ability to serve people with mental health conditions, substance use disorders, and co-occurring conditions after the collaborative compared to when it began.

The reentry learning collaborative made measurable progress in building local capacity, increasing knowledge and strengthening cross-system partnerships. While opportunities remain to encourage and strengthen engagement and address system-level barriers, this work has laid a strong foundation for continued collaboration and improvement.
